Intro

As we start 2020 together, we are going to spend five weeks looking at a series of 'one another' statements in the New Testament. The 'one anothers' of the scriptures speak into the various relationships that we find ourselves in as we follow Jesus, and in particular the relationships that we find ourselves in with the church family. The phrase 'one another' has rich usage in the New Testament, occurring 100 times and being used in all but five books of the New Testament (1 & 2 Timothy, Philemon, 3 John and Jude). From the lips of Jesus we hear these words:

"By this all people will know that you are my disciples, if you love for one another" (John 13:35)

And with these words Jesus establishes a new ethic for his disciples with the desire to see the world impacted by their witness to Christ. While the focus of these 'one another' verses is primarily on the relationships between those who follow Jesus, as we will see the goal of this is our faithful witness to the world.

Through this series, we will be encouraged to treat others with love, care, compassion, hospitality and much more, so that together St Luke's continues to grow in our faithful witness to Miranda and beyond.

* The Bible studies in this series will be done in the week **following** the Sunday sermon. The hope is that as we discuss the different passages and ideas together, there will be great opportunity for tangible and well-developed application each week in your Bible study group grounding the sermon and the study in the life of St Luke's and the members of your group.

Study 1:

United to One Another

Introduction - Talk

Read the following verses and discuss this question for each one: What impact does it have on your relationships with others – in your family, in your friendship groups, at church – if you lived in the way the verse describes?

- Romans 12:16 "Live in harmony with one another. Do not be proud, but be willing to associate with people of low position. Do not be conceited."
- **Ephesians 4:32** "Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you."
- 1 Thessalonians 5:15 "Make sure that nobody pays back wrong for wrong, but always try to be kind to each other (one another) and to everyone else."
- **John 6:43** "Don't grumble among one another"

Sermon Reflection

Do you have any questions, comments, reflections from the sermon on Sunday?

Read Romans 12:1-8 (note that in the NIV, v.5 "all the others" = "one another")

1) What initial thoughts, questions comments arise from the passage?

2) Paul begins chapter 12 with a very important 'therefore'. In the following verses Paul will give a series of commands about the kind of life the person who trusts Jesus is to live, but what stands behind everything that Paul is going to say? (read chapter 11 verses 33-36)

- 3) In verses 2-3 of chapter 12, twice Paul structures sentences with a "Do not..." followed by "but..."
 - a. What are the things that Paul says Christians are not to do in light of the mercy of God? What are Christians to do in response to the mercy of God?

b. How does this begin to reshape how we think about our place within the church and our relationship to the world?

A lot of what we have spoken about so far talks about the relationships within the church, and rightly so. It is those who have faith in Jesus who are united to one another. However, it is not simply unity for unity sake. There is a very significant missional edge to the idea of being united to one another.

Read John 17:20-26

5) While loving and belonging to one another is the foundation for the relationships within the church, what is the missional aspect to the way that Christians relate to each other?

Nothing is able to unite people from such diverse backgrounds, ethnicities, socio-economic standards, cultures and more, than the gospel. The gospel is the thing that breaks down all barriers and walls between people in a way that nothing else can.

6) How do you think that Christians being united to one another can help people see Jesus?

7) How might we need to change/alter our thinking around what we have as individuals to be the type of people that Paul describes here in Romans 12?

8)	What are some examples of how understanding ourselves as united to one another in Christ would help us reach out into Miranda with the news of Jesus?
9)	What are some ways that you might change/grow your relationships with those within the church for the sake of the mission to the world?

Study 2:

Devoted to One Another

Introduction - Talk

It is often hard to talk about humility without appearing proud about being humble. However, share amongst the group if there are particular people who encourage you because of their humility.

Read the following verses:

- **Philippians 2:3** "Regard one another as more important than yourselves"
- Ephesians 5:21 "Be subject to one another"
- 1 Peter 5:5 "Clothe yourselves in humility toward one another"

Initially, how might the way of thinking that these brief verses describe, come into conflict with the way that the world wants us to think about our relationships with others?

Sermon Reflection

Do you have any questions, comments, reflections from the sermon on Sunday?

Read John 13:1-17

1) In the opening verses we are twice told "Jesus knew..."

What are the two things that Jesus knew to set up these events?

disciples? Are they shocking to you?
3) Peter significantly misunderstands what Jesus is doing. a. What is Peter's complaint?
b. How does Jesus shape the disciples understanding of what he is doing?
Application 4) What are some examples of tasks or actions that we may consider below us – the "foot washing" of our day? How might the example of Jesus shape how we approach such situations?
Read Romans 12:9-21 This passage continues from where we left off last week. Recap the things that Paul had said in the opening eight verses of chapter 12.
5) In these verses Paul lists a number of ways that we may think about and treat one another. Are there any things that Paul says here that stand

out to you? Why?

a.	Make a list of all the things that Paul says that people who follow Jesus are to do.
b.	Make a second list of the 'do nots'.
C.	As you read through each of these lists, what themes/trends do you notice?

Here we see Paul painting a picture of the type of community that follows the example of Jesus. For all that Paul says here, we are given a picture of what being devoted to one another in love looks like.

d. Of all the things that Paul writes in these verses, what are the ones that you find hardest to live out in relationship with others?

Application

6) Self-sacrificial love and service is one of the marks of the Christian community. As people who follow the way of Jesus, what are some ways that you can consider others more important than yourself and be devoted to one another in 2020?

Study 3:

Redeemed to Serve One Another

Introduction – Talk

Most people want their lives to mean something, to be part of something larger than just themselves, to have left a mark by the days that we have lived. One way to come at this, is to simply ask the question – "at the end of your life what is going to matter most to you?"

At the end of your life, how would you hope that people would finish this sentence?

"The most important thing I know about their life was..."

For most of us, it will be less about the stuff that we have and far more about the people that surround us.

Sermon Reflection

Do you have any questions, comments, reflections from the sermon on Sunday?

Read Galatians 5:1-15

1) What initial thoughts, questions, comments arise from the passage?

- 2) The situation seems to be that there are some people in Galatia, who were trying to draw those who trusted Jesus, to fulfil the Old Testament Jewish traditions. They were attempting to persuade Gentiles (non-Jews), who had come to trust Jesus, that they needed not only to have faith in Jesus for their salvation but also to fulfil the Old Testament Jewish customs as well.
 - a) The language of 'freedom' and being 'set free' alludes to the idea of being redeemed from something. It's the idea of being moved from one state of existing and finding yourself in a new way of being. What does Paul say that those that follow Jesus have been redeemed from?

b) Initially, Paul says that they will 'again' be put under a 'yoke of slavery'. For the Christians in Galatia, who would have been predominantly Gentiles, how can they be put under a yoke of slavery again when they had never been under the law of the Jews?

c) Why do you think doing Old Testament things, for those who had heard the gospel and started to follow Jesus, might have been tempting?

3)	Paul says that returning to Old Testament Jewish traditions and customs would undermine their faith in Jesus. Why might Paul have such strong words to say about this?
4)	Are there any similarities that we might be tempted by today? What are the things that we may be tempted to find our confidence in rather than through faith in Jesus?
	Paul paints the negative picture, in verses 13 & 14 we see the positive

more importance is for what we have been redeemed.

5) The common theme here is that freedom, or redemption, is both the means and the goal of the Christian life. If the gospel is about anything, then it is all about redemption. Reflecting on your own understanding of the gospel, how often would you view life following Jesus as freedom? Why/why not is that something that you consider often?

6) Paul has both a warning and a command in verses 13-14. a) Speaking to those who have been redeemed in Christ, what does Paul warn us against using the freedom we now have?
b) For what is our redemption and freedom we find in Christ to be used?
Application 7) In what areas of the life of St Luke's do you see this happening?
8) In what areas of the life of St Luke's are you involved in serving others?

Imagine a church, where everyone was using their gifts in service of one another (this takes us back to study one where we saw that in Christ we are united to one another and so what we have now belongs to each other) out of an expression of the freedom that they have in Christ. What would that kind of place be like?

What are some ways that either you individually or as a group may be able to serve someone else?

Introduction – Talk

When was the last time someone really encouraged you?

When was the last time you encouraged someone **and** they encouraged you (mutual encouragement)?

Sermon Reflection

Do you have any questions, comments, reflections from the sermon on Sunday?

Read 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18

1) Here Paul seems to be addressing an issue that has arisen within the church in Thessalonica regarding those who have died trusting in Jesus. What is Paul's motive in addressing this issue?

2) In situations of great grief and loss, how can thinking about the return of Jesus and the resurrection of the dead give hope when things are difficult?

3)	Paul concludes this section with the command to encourage one another, or build one another up, with these words. How might a focus on the resurrection be an encouragement in both difficult times and also when times are not so hard?

Read Romans 14:13-21

7)	What seems to be the situation in the church in Rome that Paul is
	addressing?

- 8) The issue of food and whether one can eat it or not seems to have been a dividing issue for the church in Rome. While appropriate diets may not be as much of an issue for the church today, division like we see here often goes against the mutual encouragement and building up of one another that ought to be the desire of those who trust Jesus.
 - a. Why do you think that people who follow Jesus can often be tempted to be divided over all kinds of issues, whether large or small?

b. What do you think motivates this kind of division?

9) Here Paul is not saying that conflict or heated discussion is a bad thing. There are times when we even see Paul in heated conflict with others (e.g. Barnabas in Acts 15). So conflict itself is not to be avoided at all costs, but what is Paul's way of establishing appropriate relationships for the church in verse 19?

If you have time, read Hebrews 10:23-25

The author of Hebrews writes the whole letter as a word of encouragement. Here in chapter 10, the author is encouraging those to trust Jesus, and to keep pressing on even under the weight of persecution, because of what Jesus has done. In these verses we read three times "let us" and once "let us not…" What is the general impression that your group gets from each of these commands?

The final command is to "let us encourage one another" which comes as the correlation to not giving up meeting together. One of the primary ways of encouraging one another is to simply turn up and meet together regularly. What are some things that may get in the way of you meeting regularly with the people of God?

What can you do in 2020 to meet more regularly with the people of God this year?

Application

As we think about the life of St Luke's, what are some ways that you can build up others in 2020?

How might an attitude of wanting to live at peace and pursuing mutual edification influence your relationships, and indeed conflicts, this year?

Who are some people who you know, who you think may need some encouragement?

Study 5:

Open Hearts to Welcome One Another

Introduction

How would you define hospitality?

Have you ever experienced what you would consider radical hospitality? What made it special?

Sermon Reflection

Do you have any questions, comments, reflections from the sermon on Sunday?

Read 1 Peter 4:1-9

1) What initial thoughts, questions comments arise from the passage?

Through this section Peter wants to shift the thinking of his readers in regard to both their willingness to suffer for what is right and, also, in how they live for God in the here and now. We will focus on verses 7-9 and on how we live in light of what Jesus has done.

2) Peter lists a few things in these verses that all go together. What are some of the things that Peter says those who follow Jesus should give themselves to because the end of all things is near?

3)	The picture that we are seeing here is a picture of the type of life that the Christian person lives. When we combine deep love for others, hospitality and serving one another, how might our view and experience of 'hospitality' enlarge beyond where you started with the opening question?
4)	Peter qualifies hospitality by saying that it is to be done "without grumbling". Why might we be tempted to grumble when being hospitable to one another? Why do you think it is Peter's desire that we offer hospitality to one another "without grumbling"?
5)	Peter concludes this section by saying that all of this, whether our offering of hospitality or our using of our gifts, is to be done to bring glory to God. How does our hospitality actually bring glory to God?

7)	Does hospitality require a home? What are some ways that we can sho)W
	hospitality in ways other than using a home?	

In the end, being an hospitable people is far more about an attitude of the heart than anything else. It is where everything that we have looked at in this series leads us. When we know that we are united to one another in Christ, when we humbly think more highly of others than ourselves, when we use our gifts to serve others and when we seek to lift one another up, we will naturally be an hospitable people, showing kindness and love to others.
