The Gospel Shaped Church

"This letter is the most important piece in the New Testament. It is the purest gospel. It is well worth a Christian's while not only to memorise it word for word but also to occupy himself with it daily, as though it were the daily bread of the soul. It is impossible to read or to meditate on this letter too much or too well"

Mark Twain once said, "a classic is something everyone wants to have read and no one wants to read." I think this is very true also when it comes to the book of Romans. Many of us have probably heard impressive statements made by theological giants like Martin Luther who called it "the purest gospel," or Thomas Draxe describing the book as "the quintessence and perfection of saving doctrine."

Yet although Romans is rich with profound doctrinal truth, we ought not be so intimidated. We must remember it is first written as a letter to real people in a unique circumstance and with a clear purpose.

At the very crux of Paul's purpose for writing his letter to the church in Rome is the gospel. His desire is for the gospel to bring these Jewish and Gentile Christians in Rome together but, at the same time, to see the good news of Jesus go out further and produce even more fruit.

And I believe this is a timely book for us. For right now, is it not challenging to feel a strong sense of unity as we are isolated and unable to meet? Similarly, we may wonder how we might have any opportunity to share the gospel when we are not leaving the house, going to work, studying or seeing friends. However, in this time we must still believe the gospel has the power to transform lives. To pray that God would bring us even closer together as brothers and sisters in Christ, and to give us new opportunities to reach those who desperately need to hear the glorious news of Jesus.

Study 1:

Why the gospel is great

Romans 1:1-17

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- 1) Have you ever read Romans? What do you think it is about?
- 2) Romans is often considered as a hard book to study. Why do you think this is so?
- 3) OPTIONAL: Do an online Quiz together. Go to Kahoot.com and search for "Romans introduction questions"

 - Putting a box around any repeated words or phrases
 - Underline something that you really love

5) What strikes you about the way Paul begins the letter? What does he say about himself and the gospel?

6) What was Paul's aim as an apostle? (v.5)

7)	Re-read verses 8-14. What is Paul praying will take place? What is the "harvest" he is hoping to have among them?
8)	Why might people have been ashamed about the good news of Jesus? How is the gospel really the "power of God"?
9)	In verse 17, Paul speaks of a "righteousness of/from God," a phrase that will be repeated throughout the letter (1:17, 3:5, 21, 22, 25, 26; 10:3). What do you think it means? Why is righteousness so central to the gospel?

10)	How do you think a Jew and a Gentile would have felt after reading these words from Paul? How is Paul hoping it will shape the way they relate to each other? How might it encourage or challenge us too?
11)	Without referring to any gospel outline you've learnt, how would you summarise the gospel in a couple of sentences?

12) Currently, we are all cutting down on social interactions due to the need to distance ourselves from one another. • How is the current situation going to make it harder to talk to others about Jesus? • What new opportunities might there be to tell others the good news that weren't there before? • This week, how are you going to actively take steps to sharing the gospel with others?

3) Why does Paul say God's anger is being revealed? Why are people without excuse? (vv.18-20)

4) What happens as people look at creation instead of worship God? (vv 21-23)

5) Often in times of crisis, we will often be drawn to find comfort in things other than God. What have you been tempted to worship as we've experienced the threat of Coronavirus?

6)	Although Paul hasn't shared the answer yet, what do you think is the antidote for an idolatrous heart?

8)	What happens when God gives people over to their sinfulness?
9)	What does God teach about homosexuality? How does it illustrate his main point?
10)	Imagine reading out this passage to an unbelieving friend, family member, classmate or colleague at work. How do you feel? What makes us embarrassed or wants to make excuses for what we've just studied?
